Theme

When studying multilingual competence, acquisition, and use, we are engaged in a variety of data-driven research. Field and laboratory research depend in different ways on observation and experimentation. Although they lead to either more qualitative or more quantitative approaches, they both aim at describing the mechanisms and characteristics of acquiring and using more than one language, such as interference, transfer processes in multilingual speakers, or language change in contexts of language contact. This Winter School is dedicated to the crucial questions of how theories and methods from psycholinguistics as well as sociolinguistics can be used to promote a better understanding of the multilingual mind.

A particular emphasis lies on issues related to heritage language maintenance and development in migrant communities. This will be the key subject on Monday. Jason Rothman addresses the importance of differences in input quality and the needs to be factored for when assessing and labelling the competence outcomes in heritage speaker bilingualism. Ad Backus focuses on the respective contributions of sociolinguistics and psycholinguistics for improving linguistic theory, and Florian Jaeger approaches questions of statistical modelling of linguistic data.

Arrangement

The Winter School is designed as an encounter for young and senior multilingualism researchers. In order to stimulate critical and creative thinking. plenty of time will be reserved for the exchange between experts and PhD students who are asked to present their projects in the form of a poster.
